However, I think Valentine's Day is for everyone and even for our church. When I was in elementary school, we always made Valentine mail boxes to take to school for our cards to go into. One year I had the prize winning box which actually looked alarmingly similar to the current church mail box. A neighbor who was really good at crafts helped me make it. Well, to be totally honest, I more or less watched her make it. I was never very artsy. I think I used to get an average number of Valentine's. I was not the most popular kid but I was never disappointed in my supply. Some cards were homemade,



some really fancy and some little tiny ones with no envelopes. My favorite part of Valentine's, however, was what we found at our door step every year. My father was not an ideal parent but he knew a thing or two about the right kind of surprises to give his three ladies. Every year there were three hollow chocolate Valentine's with our names on them in boxes at our door. My mother and sister and I knew they would be there but they were always different- some bigger- some smaller. Our names were in different colors and scripts. I was very sad when I went to college and was suddenly left out of the hollow heart delivery. I got a big fancy card instead after that. A lot of random friends have sent me Valentine's over the years. I actually don't think I ever got much Valentine attention from boyfriends. Did I always manage to break up with people before Feb. 14?

This year the church as been receiving some early Valentine's. Some people who live elsewhere and attend other churches now still send us random contributions at this time of year. Some former members who have been gone for years, still pledge even though they have not seen us for years. We changed their lives in some way and they love us so they send Valentine's. In a way I think of every gift we receive for the Legacy Fund or the Endowment as a sort of posthumous Valentine. Never think that love is not stronger than death. Whenever, I look at our outside sign or look at our kitchen and bathroom floors or our new brick patio I think of the many members who are now here only in spirit still sending us love. Maybe you are getting an early tax return that is bigger than expected. Perhaps you have a sudden windfall. You could send the church a Valentine. We need it. We would appreciate it. It would show us you love us. We love you too. A church is all about creating a place where everyone can see themselves as lovable. Love is all about multiplying and adding not about dividing and subtracting. Send us some love this month. It can come in many forms. It will probably multiply. Love from me to all of you.

This month's service is on Friday February 15 and is titled: 'Meditations on the Mystic Heart.' by John Shearer





#### **President's Article - Love Languages**

In honor of Valentine's day and the whole I have the perpetual flu...Dr. Gary Chapman wrote the five love languages, the book is written for Christians but applies to everyone. Everyone, Dr. Chapman says has a primary love language. Mine is split between Quality time and acts of service. I took the quiz so I know. Now don't get me wrong words of Affirmation are good too and gifts are graciously received.



Words of Affirmation—Actions don't always speak louder than words. If this is your love language, unsolicited compliments mean the world to you. Hearing the words, "I love you," are important—hearing the reasons behind that love sends your spirits skyward. Insults can leave you shattered and are not easily forgotten.

**Quality Time**—In the vernacular of Quality Time, nothing says "I love you" like full, undivided attention. Being there for this type of person is critical, but really being there—with the TV off, fork and knife down, and all chores and tasks on standby—makes your significant other feel truly special and loved. Distractions, postponed dates, or the failure to listen can be especially hurtful.

Receiving Gifts—Don't mistake this love language for materialism; the receiver of gifts thrives on the love, thoughtfulness, and effort behind the gift. If you speak this language, the perfect gift or gesture shows that you are known, you are cared for, and you are prized above whatever was sacrificed to bring the gift to you. A missed birthday, anniversary, or a hasty, thoughtless gift would be disastrous—so would the absence of everyday gestures.

Acts of Service—Can vacuuming the floors really be an expression of love? Absolutely! Anything you do to ease the burden of responsibilities weighing on an Acts of Service person will speak volumes. The words he or she most wants to hear are, "Let me do that for you." Laziness, broken commitments, and making more work for them, tell those with this language their feelings don't matter.

**Physical Touch**—This language isn't all about the bedroom. A person whose primary language is Physical Touch is, not surprisingly, very touchy. Hugs, pats on the back, holding hands, and thoughtful touches on the arm, shoulder, or face—they can all be ways to show excitement, concern, care, and love. Physical presence and accessibility are crucial, while neglect or abuse can be unforgivable and destructive.

## Labyrinth Café Concerts Presents : John Gorka Saturday, February 9 at 7:30pm



**John Gorka**, lauded by Rolling Stone as "the preeminent male singer-songwriter of the new folk movement," was born and raised in New Jersey, where he received a guitar as a Christmas present at age 10. His older brother swiped it, so Gorka took up the banjo instead. He first began writing songs with a church group, before eventually moving away from home to attend Moravian College, where he was exposed to the folk-music scene. After encouragement from Nanci Griffith, he won the Kerrville Folk Festival's New Folk Competition, and released his debut disc in 1987. A mainstay of the folk scene since the mid-1980s, Gorka balances his rich baritone and introspective songwriting with his trademark dry wit and humor. John Gorka's music demonstrates an easy melodic sensibility: Nothing is contrived or overproduced. His work is built around little more than his unmistakable voice and the simple, clean sounds of his guitar. www.johngorka.com

#### "Read, Discuss, Act on Mass Incarceration" Continues Sunday, February 10 and 24, 1 p.m. at UUCFL

All are welcome to address the issues posed by Michelle Alexander in her book, "The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness".

Join the 20 people from diverse environments, few of whom knew more than a few of the others who had a stimulating initial January 6 meeting and resolved to meet five more times over the next three months to discuss Alexander's analysis of the rebirth of a U.S. Caste system whose population consists primarily of African American men whose lives have been constrained by their contacts with the criminal justice system and who therefore face life-long discrimination in housing, employment, and civic participation.

The Mark Jim Codes

Alexander graphically depicts how this criminal justice system, based on a hyper-inflated War on Drugs, functions as a means of social control of this population following the dismantling of Jim Crow in the 1960s.

Alexander challenges the civil rights community and all of us to place mass incarceration at the forefront of a new movement for racial justice in America. The group formed to absorb Professor Alexander's thesis via reading and discussion with the intent of then formulating and carrying out ACTION.

At the February sessions the first 4 chapters will be discussed. That includes (1) a history of racialized social control in the U.S. which has been achieved largely by appealing to the racism and vulnerability of lower-class whites; (2) the structure of mass incarceration with a focus on the War on Drugs, where enormous financial incentives have been granted to law enforcement to engage in mass drug arrests through military-style tactics;(3)How a formally race-neutral criminal justice system can manage to round up, arrest and imprison an extraordinary number of black and brown men when people of color are actually no more likely to be guilty of drug crimes and many other offenses than whites. ;and (4) How, in many respects, release from prison does not represent the beginning of freedom but instead a cruel new phase of stigmatization and control where myriad laws, rules and regulations discriminate against ex-offenders and effectively prevent their meaningful re-integration into the mainstream economy and society.

#### **South Florida Climate Action Conference**



I believe that climate change is the most important issue facing us today, and the SE Cluster is partnering to present the South Florida Climate Action Conference. We are joining members of the scientific-technical, faith-based, government, and activist communities in Broward, Miami-Dade, Monroe and Palm Beach counties to exchange information and work together to implement the SE Florida Regional Climate Action Plan [rcap]. Probably because of sea level rise regional leaders have gotten together and written our regional climate action plan. We are fortunate to have this plan, for most areas of the country have not done planning like this

The SE Florida regional climate change compact addresses how we can mitigate the causes of climate change and adapt to its consequences. The conference will stimulate dialogue and encourage us to engage in direct action to support the regional climate action plan [RCAP]. The RCAP is our region's response to climate change and sea level rise; by advocating and implementing this plan we will move our region toward climate resilience and sustainability.
