Book Group Reconvenes on Sept. 23

The UUCFL Book group will start up again in



September with a discussion of "Mary, Called Magdalene" by Margaret George. This historical novel takes us into the world of the early Jesus movement from the perspective of the enigmatic figure of Mary of Magdala. It is long but is easy reading and can be found in paperback. We will gather after church on Sept. 23 for the discussion.

For October, we will read "American Gospel: God, The Founding Fathers and the Making of a Nation by Jon Meachum. This book was suggested by book group regular Miriam Ownby and will give us lots of insights into the founders of our country including many figures with Unitarian inclinations.

In November, we will read "The Known World" by Edward P. Jones. This fascinating novel won Pulitzer Prize. It looks at the question of slavery and race through the unusual lens of the life of some free blacks who became slave owners themselves. Read on intrepid bibliophiles.

The United Church of Christ, Congregational church did a huge national T.V. ad campaign in the last couple of years that greatly increased their number of visitors and subsequently their membership. The next big piece we need to think about is some type of celebration in December of this year for the anniversary of the first gathering of people to discuss having a Unitarian presence in Ft. Lauderdale (this was three years before the merger between the Unitarian and Universalist movements).

I think this would be a good time to have a special event and to see if we can find any of the original group who may be available to join in the celebration.

Many of us are very excited about the opportunities for making this a great year. We have a great board and good people covering many key committees. People coming to orientations have told me that have found us to be a most welcoming place and that the atmosphere is so freeing and open. It is a good year to be a Unitarian Universalist in Ft. Lauderdale. Let's celebrate who we are all year long.

Ah...the dog days of summer. Hope everyone is staying cool, and enjoying some vacation time. General Assembly is over; if you wish to read my impressions and observations go to the District web page for my report. I subscribe to a UUA list for leaders, which is open to all to subscribe (uu-leaders@lists.uua.org) and recently there has been a dialogue/discussion concerning the importance of being a member of a congregation as opposed to merely attending on a regular basis. With thanks to Helen Bishop and Rick Childs I offer some thoughts.

When one joins an organization they are making a commitment and public statement in agreement with the mission/vision of the organization. Membership usually means a stated financial contribution and the privilege of voting on issues of importance to the organization. Even though congregational meetings may be tedious they represent grassroots democracy. Then there is knowledge that membership in a congregation means connection to the larger UU world, standing for our liberal religious beliefs at the national and sometimes global level.

On another significant level one who joins a UU congregation knows the feeling of a shared and sacred commonality with who we are and our purpose of spiritual enrichment. Joining sets in motion new forces for spiritual growth and opens new pathways and experiences that will greatly expand spiritual and personal growth. Membership brings the rich personal experiences of the new member, their commitment to the future of the congregation, and their spiritual gifts to share, thus broadening and enriching the congregation. Membership in a Unitarian Universalist congregation is a rich and fulfilling experience.

Being a member of a UU congregation requires as much "inreach" as outreach, for the development of a strong Unitarian Universalist identity is one way to ensure that adults stay involved and that youth and young adults seek guidance and comfort from their Unitarian Universalist religious homes when needed. A congregation needs the ability to provide both authentic personal relationships and religious resources to engage the mind and spirit at the deepest levels. Membership in a UU congregation is an ongoing journey that does not stop when one "signs the book." Membership means involvement in shared ministry in a vibrant spiritual community and witnessing our faith to the world.


Planning Begins for UUA's General Assembly 2008, Ft. Lauderdale

The Smart Church - Part 10

Does your congregation have a sense of adventure?

Life is a great adventure or nothing at all – Helen Keller

Is your congregation willing to make a leap of faith? Is your congregation permission giving?

Could you sell your property because it is in the wrong area? ...

start and support a satellite congregation in your area? ...give away 3 plates a month to make the world a better place? In "A Failure of Nerve; Leadership in the Age of the Quick Fix" – Rabbi Edwin Friedman suggests that one of the most important traits a great leader can posses is a grand sense of adventure.

What would your congregation look like if it saw the future as a grand adventure? How would things change?

What would the budget look like? What would the long-range-plan look like?

What kind of programs would be made available? Who would the congregation be serving?

Has your congregation made a leap of faith in the past only to be frightened by the uncertainty of it? Did you fall back into the familiar? I have had the opportunity recently to spend time with some leaders of our most successful congregations.

Here is what I have noticed that they all have in common.

- 1. They have taken the time to struggle with values discernment. Therefore, they understand what their congregational values are.
- 2. They understand the highest reason for the existence of their congregation.
- 3. They are truly part of their communities. They understand who they are serving and what their ministry is.
- 4. Even when they don't have enough, they give away more of the plates then they keep.
- 5. They do not horde.
- 6. They support their leaders.
- 7. They have a great sense of adventure. They make leaps of faith and are willing to risk it all to make the world a better place.

Why are we Unitarian Universalists? Is it because we need a safe club where we are with others just like ourselves, where we feel safe and we don't have to risk anything? Or. Is Unitarian Universalism a grand adventure? Are we here not only to live up to our 7 principles and transform our own lives but to fight injustice, insist on mercy, transform the lives of others and make the world a better place?

I have high expectations for you. I believe in you. I think that you can become the best that you can be. I think that you can make a difference in yourself and in the world. I have high expectations for Unitarian Universalism. I think that Unitarian Universalism is the spiritual discipline that can change the world into a better place. I think Unitarian Universalism is the grandest adventure of all.

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

September 2- Eradicating the Concept of the Working Poor- Guest speaker Jack Liberman, of the South Florida Interfaith Worker Justice group will talk to us about issues of economic justice in our community and the country. Jack works with Rev. Gail on the Nova Campaign and other actions and will help us understand how we can help create a more just work environment for everyone.

September 9 – Water Sunday- Our annual ingathering ceremony. Bring your water and your summer stories to share with all of us. Rev. Gail will offer a homily on "Commandments, Precepts and Agreements and How they Create Healthy Community." Membership Committee hosts luncheon for all (see front cover)

Sept. 16 – Living in Awe – The days between the Jewish New Year or Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement are called The Days of Awe. Rev. Gail will talk about what it means to live in awe and how new beginnings and forgiveness are intimately intertwined.

Sept. 23 – Down the Rabbit Hole: Looking at Grief With Different Lenses: Taking a broad look at the losses that we all experience, Rev. Gail will draw on one of the plays she saw on her study leave time to give us a new angle on coming to terms with these universal experiences.

Sept. 30 – Wrestling With Theophobia – It is said that Jacob in the Jewish scriptures wrestled with God. Unitarian Universalists often have to wrestle with our fear of God, our rejection of God and our general sense of being very uncomfortable when the word is used or the topic comes up. Rev. Gail will share some of her latest research and thinking about the G word.
