I've done lots of exploring both alone and with the Florida Trail Association so if you've ever had a hankering to see a little more of Florida than the beaches and Disneyworld, this will be your chance.

Éxpect to hear about Big Cypress, Fern Forest, Green Cay and Shark Valley in the next month. Ask me about other wild places that you may have heard of but may have been hesitant to explore.

John Muir said "In every walk with nature one receives far more than he seeks." Join me to live his words.



Harpeth Rising chose to name themselves after a river because water is both dynamic and powerful. These words also describe the music created by the three women - Jordana Greenberg (violin, vocals), Rebecca Reed-Lunn (banjo, vocals) and Maria Di Meglio (cello, vocals). Unapologetic genre-benders, they fuse Folk, Newgrass, Rock and Classical into a sound that is organically unique. Hallmarks of their music include expansive three-part harmonies, consummate musicianship and



a deft, yet soulful, lyrical perspective. Harpeth Rising's roots run deep – from their varied ancestry across Eastern Europe to the musical hotbed of the Mid-South they now call home, they weave together ancient and modern ideas, creating a sound that is both familiar and impossible to categorize. "We don't set out to create something different, we just write in a way that is true to ourselves while trying to always expand and explore the new influences in our lives." says Greenberg. "We're aware of genre divisions, we're just not bound by them."

From the UUCFL Social Justice Committee:

First, I would like to thank Rev. Gail and the Board for allowing me to Chair the Social Justice Committee. Since I am relatively new to UUCFL, I thought I would share my journey to 3970 NW 21st Ave. I retired and moved to Sunrise in 2010 to take care of my ailing father. However, after he passed I realized I had neither family nor friends locally and was

in need of purpose and community. It took me a while but I finally made my way to UUCFL.

I was brought up in the Ethical Society and as a teen went to my first rally/protest on August 28, 1963, where Dr. Martin Luther King gave his "I have a Dream" speech. In college I protested the Viet Nam war although, like most college kids, I had no idea what I was really protesting. My passion for Social Justice was reignited at the age of fifty when I changed careers and landed a paralegal position with the Maryland Innocence Project. I knew from innute one it was my dream job. When I retired there was a void after I had found myself so passionate and driven in my role as an advocate for the voiceless. Currently I am also the President of the Democratic Women's Club of West Broward, where I have the opportunity to share my interests by having speakers about issues that affect our lives. I have been fortunate to network with activists in our community and would like to have them speak at UUCFL Social Justice meetings.

The horrific tragedy in Paris has brought to light our global connections, and my vision of the UUCFL Social Justice Committee is to share not only what is happening in our community but follow the guidelines of the UUA: Our justice efforts are grounded in our congregationally-driven social justice statements and our call to break down divisions, heal isolation, and honor the interconnectedness of all life and all justice issues. We model these commitments by creating

just, welcoming, and inclusive congregations.

UUCFL is fortunate to have a legacy of social activism, and we can be a conduit to share information. One avenue which we are thinking about is having a short documentary series after Sunday service with videos like The Homestretch, about the difficult plight of three homeless teens in Chicago; CitizenFour, about Edward Snowden, who leaked classified information in 2013; and Citizen Koch, the story of the Tea Party "movement" which has been financed by the billionaire Koch brothers.

Our first meeting of 2016 has been arranged by Bob and Patty Bender: Sunday January 24, 2016 at 12:45pm, Dr. Mark Solomon will be addressing "Black Lives Matter, Moral Mondays, Mainstream Politics: 2016 African-American Activism in the Context of African-American History". Dr. Solomon is currently an Associate at the WEB DuBois Institute of African and African-American Research at Harvard, where he is writing a memoir/narrative on the peace and civil rights movement of the 1940s and 1950s. The meeting is co-sponsored by Black Lives Matter Broward Alliance and The Democratic Women's Club of West Broward. Please let us know any suggestions you have and we hope you can join us on January 24th to hear Dr. Solomon. We will also be posting current events on Facebook on the **UUCFL – Blog.**
