Summer Sermon Resources

Several people have asked me for more resources to explore the subjects of some of my recent summer sermon offerings. It seemed logical to put them in one place in the Journey. In late May, I did a sermon on "Shakespeare, The Thinker" in which I spoke of the Bard as a virtual source of secular scripture for Unitarian Universalists. When asked how to deepen your own knowledge and appreciation of Shakespeare, I always suggest you start by renting some of the more accessible movie versions. A few that I have enjoyed are the Kenneth Branagh versions of "Henry V" and "Love's Labor's Lost", the Zeffereilli version of "Romeo and Juliet" and the Al Pacino vehicle "Looking for Richard" about his making of "Richard III." I also like the teen gang version of "Romeo and Juliet" with Leonardo DiCaprio and Claire Danes. The British Royal Shakespeare Company has traditional but competent versions of almost all the plays. Some of my other favorites are "As You Like It", "Twelfth Night" and "The Tempest." Reading the plays alone is a slog even for the trained English major. Attending a Shakespeare Festival where they usually do both his plays and some modern plays would be a great vacation choice.



I was happy to find some other Robertson Davies fans when I did the sermon on "Becoming Cunning UUs." Davies is a great Canadian novelist who produced two famous Trilogies- The Deptford Trilogy ([Fifth Business](#), [The Manticore](#), and [World of Wonders](#)) and The Cornish Trilogy ([The Rebel Angels](#), [What's Bred in the Bone](#) and [The Lyre of Orpheus](#)). Later in life he wrote two more novels that may have become a trilogy if he had lived long enough. The one I primarily based the sermon on is [The Cunning Man](#), which focuses on a medical doctor who also used what we would now call a holistic mind/body approach to his diagnoses and cures and who has a lot of what might be called mystical experience throughout his life. The other late novel is called [Murther and Walking Spirits](#) and has some of the same characters as [The Cunning Man](#). I also loved a book of his essays called [The Merry Heart](#). Davies was influenced by the Swiss psychologist Carl Jung and by a life long love of the theatre and the King Arthur legends which figure in the Cornish Trilogy.

All of David Spangler's books can be found described on his website at DavidSpangler.com and his blog can also be found there. David was the primary subject of my sermon on "The Real Story of the New Age." He was an early part of Findhorn in Scotland and founder of the learning center called The Lorian Foundation. I hope some of you find some additional stimulation, learning and inspiration for your life through pursuing some of these resources in greater depth. In faith that the unexamined and non reading life is not really worth living.

Death in Mississippi and Closer to Home

It has been quite a year of changes, losses and gains for me on many fronts and many of my personal changes, losses and gains are also tied into my professional life at the church. The last year saw us say goodbye to Sunny Goldenberg in a touching celebration with her family. We said farewell to some great members and welcomed some new friends into our community. Much of the year was both graced and shadowed for many of us by the continued presence of David Fisher after we thought we had lost him back in September. For me, and I suspect for many of you, this year of extra David that we had was a long grace filled moment. Watching him live every minute of his remaining life fully engaged in the moment and fully present with whoever he was with and whatever he was doing was a life lesson you could not have paid money for. It also reminded me of how Forest Church, a national Unitarian Universalist figure as a minister and author, got sort of a bonus year and used it to give us yet another book on Universalism which I am looking forward to buying and reading.

Then as most of you are aware, I also had a personal tragedy when my first cousin and a close companion from childhood died much sooner than expected. Cousin Dotty Tapscott, was quite a character and the sadness of losing her was somewhat mitigated for me by the honor and pleasure of being invited by her brother Mike to be the family Eulogist. I took this task very seriously and interviewed friends from Dotty's youth, college years and later work years. In addition to family stories, I tried to weave together a coherent narrative of Dot's life to help all of us sort out the mysteries of a life that we had not viewed up close and personal for many decades. In many ways it seemed that Dotty's life was much of a piece as she never lost her sense of adventure, her quick wit and dry humor or her commitment to her Catholic upbringing. She was always obsessed with dogs and made them a huge part of her life. She left some of her estate to keep her surviving animals happy and her beautiful shelties had been show dogs and therapy dogs. Interesting pieces of family history were found in Dotty's house. After the long rituals of Visitation, eating and drinking and story telling, a Catholic mass, burial site ritual, and a big southern lunch at the social hall at the Tupelo, MS Catholic church, two of Dot's brothers, one of the in laws and my sister and I went through Dotty's old pictures, trying to identify people in her life we had only heard about. We also went through piles of amazing letters that shed light on our parents and other relatives. It was like time out of time seeing people I had not seen for 45 or 50 years at the events, being called a girl by ancient relatives, meeting some of the young people in the family who have become great young adults. One of my cousin Mike's sons is a huge fan of Jim Morrison and Johnny Depp, who are also long time favorites of mine, which tells you a lot about my maturity level. All in all it was a celebration not just of Dotty's life but of family and community life and the continuity of life in general. My sister and I who were the ones who left the deep south found ourselves rather nostalgic about small town life and the continuity that it offers along with the down sides. I know many of you have lost loved ones in the past year. I hope the family and community rituals brought comfort to you as well. I hope all of us will find comfort and good grieving as we lift up and celebrate the amazing life of our dear David Fisher on Aug. 7 and try to share that comfort and grief with his partner Paul and his family.


Committee Meetings - Third Sundays of the Month - 9:30am

Is This the Time for Solar Panels at UUCFL?

Through the effort of Jose Ponce, we have received a proposal for photovoltaic system on the roof of our building. The options vary from a 13.8 kW to a 30.36 kW system, which would provide a substantial portion of our electricity and substantially reduce our electric utility bill. This installation would require a large capital investment, but there are also lease arrangements, where the solar panels would be owned by a private entity and we would make regular lease payments.

Steve Lange and Ken Beier have copies of the proposal, and Frank Shulman has also reviewed the proposal. So, if you want to help move the solar discussion forward, talk to Steve, Frank or Ken.

UUA Trustee Tidbits

As you know by this time the Resolution to keep General Assembly (GA) 2012 in Phoenix, AZ passed at this year's GA by a very large margin; and it will be a "Justice GA". Over the next four years leading up to this GA our Association and hopefully every congregation within will be devoting study time and energy to making GA 2012 overwhelmingly successful. The delegates indicated their concern about our nation's immigration issues by passing Congregational Study Action Issue (CSAI): Immigration as a Moral Issue, as our next four year study. Also as an Act of Immediate Witness (AIW) the Assembly called for immigration reform at the state and federal levels.

We must be leaders in insuring human rights for immigrants and refugees, and to acknowledge this as a moral issue. We need to continue to witness against Arizona SB 1070 and its implementation. The dignity of all the world's humans is central to UU principles and values, and I strongly encourage your congregation get involved in one or more of the many topics for immigration study and action. These include, but are not limited to: educating ourselves on the definitions and international agencies accountable in the issue; the economic impact of immigration on countries and individuals; the ways immigrants enrich the society in which they settle; myths vs. realities regarding immigrants; and who the immigrants are in our communities. Also we UUs need to participate and support events that support the rights and dignity of migrants and refugees, and efforts to change both national and international laws; and develop intentional awareness and programs of cultural sharing, inviting immigrants to be a part. I suggest looking at the GA Agenda from our meeting in Minneapolis for the full printing of our current CSAI.

Among other actions our AIW calls for us to join in tourism and product boycotts of Arizona in order to apply economic pressure on the state, to call on the U.S. President to reassert the federal government's exclusive control over the laws pertaining to immigration, to monitor legislation in other states and witness against similar anti-immigrant proposals, and to persist in our efforts until humane/just federal comprehensive immigration is achieved.

It is important that we UUs do more than just verbally support those in our faith who are "walking our social justice talk". Please know I am available to converse on issues that concern us all: jlund@uua.org or 813-931-9727. I also hope you are enjoying a relaxing summer as you continue to important work in your congregation.

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
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The Seven Principles of Unitarian Universalists
