

Fall Adult Religious Education (RE) at UUCFL

Several of us are still working out the details for the kind of adult religious education experiences that will be available at UUCFL this fall. Betty Brantley and the Building the World We Dream About Team are trying to figure out a way to offer this exciting new curriculum on identity and diversity here. DRE Susan Friend and I have talked about offering some one shot evening experiences and an occasional after church workshop.

Starting on Tuesday Oct. 19, and running for at least 6 weeks, I will offer a piece of a new UUA developed class called "What Moves Us." This class, created by UU theologian Thandeka, looks at the



more emotional and spiritual side of our movement by investigating major figures in our past who experienced moments of transcending mystery and wonder and offers readings and exercises to help us have similar experiences. As I always do with existing curriculums I will likely give it my own unique twist. This class will start at 7:00pm and run for about two hours. The cost will be \$25 for the whole series or \$5.00 per evening. I will get a flyer or brochure out closer to the start time. Look forward to more experiences to deepen your journey. If we get volunteers to help with the food preparation we will start the \$2.00 lunch and Sunday enrichment and Transformative Tuesday programs up later in the year. The Joys of Delayed Gratification

We live in a very fast paced world. We want what we want and we want it now. We email someone or text them or leave a voice message and we are indignant if we don't hear back immediately. It is hard to recall that once upon a time in this very galaxy and not so very long ago, we had to wait several weeks for a reply to a letter. We could only connect with someone by phone if we happened to find them at home. How did we survive? I experienced a bit of this in D.C. on my recent trip as about two thirds of my friends are retired. Some of them do not find it necessary to be plugged in at every moment. I even stayed at two homes with no wifi and one with no internet connection of any kind. Also because it is assumed, in the nation's capital, that everyone owns a laptop there are almost none of the internet cafes that can be found in any developing country.

I was at times forced into a black hole of communication deficit and at times I found I liked it very much. I had to actually trust that people would show up when they had said they would and not call them every five minutes to see what street they were on. I was able to live in blissful ignorance for a couple of days at a time of trouble brewing in various aspects of my personal and professional world. I figured if anything was totally in need of my intervention it would eventually result in a call to my cell phone.

Another thing I focused on during my trip was how long it takes for some of us to be able to take in advice given by another. My close friend Laquitia, who is a bit on the blunt side, has been after me for years to loose weight for my health and so that I can be available as a late life travel companion for her. This year when she saw that I had finally taken her suggestions and acted on them she was gratified and amazed. She said, " I had totally given up on you, Gail. I thought you had just gotten a little too comfortable being fat and had forgotten how much more fun you could have if you were more mobile." Just being able to walk to her favorite outdoor coffee place and go up and down the stairs at the metro was a joy I have not had for about six years. I have been over 200 lbs. for about 14 years and frankly I had given up on myself. But this past year something clicked and I tried a new approach and now I feel and hopefully look more like I did all these years ago. I walked around the national Zoo and was able to tour entire art galleries rather than look at one exhibit and then retire to the cafe and eat pastries. I know how hard it is to wait for a good outcome. I was so caught up in instant gratification for so long but now I am delighted to be enjoying the fruits of delayed gratification with the pay off of having a lot of old pleasures at my fingertips again. My message to you this fall is, it is never too late to create a positive outcome for at least some of life's challenges. May you strive this year for taking the time to go slow and work for change on yourself and in the world knowing that the results may be slow in coming but all the more rewarding when they arrive.





We have always been lacto-ovo (we eat eggs and dairy), with Lenten spates of veganism (no animal products). In the main, our diet consists of lots of vegetables, beans, grains, and a smaller part of eggs and dairy. We use soy based products (like Boca Burgers and Smart Dogs) as they are high in protein and low in calories. During my pregnancies I supplemented my diet with protein drinks that had seaweed and whey protein. Overall, we are all very healthy, and while I have always struggled with my weight (usually due to overindulgence in cheese and eating too much in general), no one else in my family ever has. When you don't eat meat, you take in less bad cholesterol, fewer hormones, and much less fat. So, being a vegetarian is good for you.

Now the kicker, it is much better for everyone else too. It is good for the animals which you do not eat (they really appreciate not being eaten); it is good for the water supply (cattle and other animals raised for meat generate lots of manure, which, when rain falls on it, drains unsavory things into the water supply); it is good for those all over the world who do not have enough food (eating grain feeds many more folks than the same amount of grain used to raise animals for meat); it is good for the air supply (less methane); it is good for the open land and prairies (grazing cattle destroys open prairie, as the cattle pull the grass out by the roots, and trample what little is left).

So, do I expect you all to become vegetarians-not really, but, if you cut down on your meat consumption, it really helps. Many of you have heard of "Meatless Mondays". Folks are doing it, as well as some fancy restaurants in New York and LA. The Internet provides a wealth of info about veg diets, recipes, health, and humane concerns issues. Some of you know that the many lunches that I have prepared for you have been vegetarian. Half the time folks don't even realize they are eating meat free. The days of nasty tofu surprise are over. Come join me and other vegetarians during the month of October and go meatless a few times. Your body will like it, the planet will like it and the little piggies will too!!

Next your backroom UUCFLers delivered a huge pile of ideas: *How are we going to do it?*



UUA President Meets Dalai Lama

September 16, 2010

Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) President Peter Morales recently met with Tibetan spiritual leader His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama during the 33rd World Congress of the International Association for Religious Freedom (IARF), held in Kochi, India. Morales represented the UUA at the conference, speaking on the topic of religion and human rights.

The Dalai Lama gave the conference's inaugural address and met with approximately two dozen IARF attendees afterward, including Morales. Morales had the opportunity to sit next to the Dalai Lama. Morales asked the Dalai Lama to share his views on the intersection of science and religion, to which the Dalai Lama had made reference during his IARF address. In his comments, His Holiness spoke about how religion needs to be open to science and even open to revising religious teachings when science gives us new insights.


