What My Sabbatical Will Do For UUCFL

On May 18 at the Annual Meeting some of you learned for the first time that I am going on sabbatical. What you may be saying does this mean? I thought only tenured professors took sabbaticals. Actually, the promise of a sabbatical is written into the contracts of almost every full time minister in the Unitarian Universalist tradition and most other mainstream religious groups. The rationale behind this practice is that after seven or so years of constantly producing sermons and planning for classes, a person might be just a bit burned out and in need of some serious refueling. The alternative to such a practice is that the minister or professor might be in danger of becoming quite dull and heaven forbid even repetitive.



UUCFL has never had a minister stay long enough to take a sabbatical in its 50 year history so what better time to start a new tradition than in this 50th Anniversary year for the church. It seems a great way to start off a new cycle in the life of the community.

A sabbatical is different from either vacation or study leave. Generally, the minister uses the time for writing projects, personal spiritual development, academic pursuits, social justice projects or some combination thereof. The goal is for the minister to recharge, perhaps uncover some new grand passions and some new directions for ministry that will in time benefit the congregation.

The benefits for UUCFL from my taking a sabbatical are many. You will hear a variety of different voices from the pulpit, lay services, guest ministers and community speakers. You will develop new skills from within your midst as you fill in for me on many areas of church life. Some of you will lead services, offer Adult R.E., classes, lead book groups, take the lead in social justice projects and offer compassionate care and a listening ear to each other. All of you will feel pride that you have broken a cycle of short term ministries and are keeping your promises as a responsible and caring employer.

To save strain on the church, especially the hard working Sunday Services Committee (which I would love to see renamed as the Celebrations and Worship Ministry Team), I am taking the sabbatical in two 3 months pieces in two different calendar years. This will help with both the church finances and my personal finances.

During the initial section of Sabbatical Part I, I will be taking several classes in Santa Fe, New Mexico. I have signed up for two Seminars on Eastern Religious Classics at St. John's College and a week long workshop on using Poetry in Worship, Liturgy and Sermons at Ghost Ranch. I will stay with various friends out west as I work on my writing project "Mary Poppins as a Spiritual Guide for All Ages." It is my hope that we will all benefit from this time apart and that there will much growth and learning all around. I have great faith in you. For this first part of the sabbatical I will be away from July 7- Oct. 12. This is not a great deal longer than I have been away some summers before.



Dignity Drive for The Cooperative Feeding Program

The following idea was inspired by the recent Dignity Drive at River of Grass.]

Many of us are aware that The Cooperative Feeding Program (www.feedingbroward.org) provides a food pantry and emergency food boxes to the needy in our community. Some may not know that they also offer clothing, underclothes, shoes, grooming and hygiene products. I was surprised and dismayed to discover that the program so desperately needs men's underwear that it is willing to accept used undergarments. Having to wear discarded underwear would erode anyone's self-respect. Let's have a Dignity Drive for the month of June where we collect **NEW underwear**, socks, and toiletries for MEN, the major recipients of ongoing help. Discount and dollar stores offer inexpensive, new men's undergarments and personal items. Please bring in men's NEW:

- Boxers or briefs (size 36"-42", large, or extra large)
- Tube or crew socks
- T-shirts (size large or extra large)
- Shaving supplies: razors, blades, shaving creams, aftershave
- Oral hygiene supplies: tooth brushes, tooth pastes, mouthwashes
- Hair supplies: shampoos, brushes, combs
- Nail supplies: nail clippers, nail scrub brushes, files or emery boards
- Body hygiene supplies: deodorants, antiperspirants, and soaps

Social Justice on Marriage to Be Discussed

At the District Annual Meeting last month the minister from Naples, The Rev. Kathleen Korb, introduced a resolution calling for the District to support an Action of Immediate Witness [AIW] at General Assembly 08(GA) to oppose The Florida Marriage Protection Amendment. The resolution passed.

There will be a District Ingathering on Wednesday, June 25, at 4:45 - 6:00 in the convention center Floridian D at which time we, the organizing team for this AIW, will sign-up volunteers for petition signature gathering and have more info as to where & when the petitions will be ready. Please come to the ingathering. Or contact me with your email address and cell phone number.

Rev. Korb and myself are looking for a good sized group to gather petitions. And a dedicated smaller group to help organize this.

Those of you that have been to GA may be familiar with the process of adopting an AIW. Unlike a Study/Action Issue all of the AIW process unfolds at GA. An AIW is initiated by an individual "and moves through the entire creation and adoption process during one GA. The AIW process allows Unitarian Universalists to respond quickly to social issues deemed urgent. Adopted AIWs are used by congregations in local efforts and empower the Washington Office for Advocacy to take action and recommend action through other departments of the UUA and other UU groups." Certainly our proposed AIW fits these criteria. http://www.uua.org/socialjustice/ issuesprocess/currentissues/104486.shtml On Friday at GA, or possibly earlier, we will need volunteers to gather signatures from delegates on our AIW petition. If the Commission on Social Witness [CSW] selects our AIW for possible submission to the Final Plenary Agenda it will be on the Saturday AM Plenary agenda. The delegates then choose the AIWs for the Final Agenda. Those AIWs that are chosen have a mini assembly of their own right after that Plenary to discuss changes to the resolution. After that, and examination by the CSW, the AlWs are placed on the Final Agenda. If that Plenary passes them by a 2/3 vote they become an Action of Immediate Witness. There can be up to 6 AlWs. They are not in competition with each other. If it is adopted it would generate local media coverage. Florida Congregations, Clusters and the District would then have the opportunity to use it for action since it is an official proclamation of our Denomination.

It's Time to Get Excited! - UUA's General Assembly is Coming June 25–29, 2008 - Right Here to Our Home Town!!



Focus! Things are now in focus! I've been saying the last couple of months that things are coming into focus, and now it has happened!

All our task area coordinators are sharpening their plans for the orientation and training of the volunteers in the 24 hours before GA starts, at 2 PM on Wednesday, June 25th.

Actually, because the registration desks will be open Tuesday afternoon from 2 to 6 PM, June 24th, early birds (including ministers and DREs attending Ministry Days at the Signature Grand and congregational leaders attending UU University at Fort Lauderdale Grande) will have a chance to register with relative ease the day before GA officially opens.

Shuttle buses will be plying an east route and a west route, picking up GA registrants at the nine GA hotels along SE 17th Street and Route A1A every 15 minutes during peak hours and at longer intervals during valley hours, delivering them to the Broward County Convention Center and returning them to their hotel.

From the 7 to 7:30 AM Spiritual Practices (in the Fort Lauderdale Grande) to the 10 PM to Midnight Special Events (in the Hyatt Pier 66), each day will be filled with multiple events—workshops, panel discussions, speakers, business sessions, and worship. One of our UUCFL congregants, after looking through the GA Program listings, remarked, "There's too much going on. I don't think I dare go!"

My response is, "There's so much going on, you can't afford not to go!" Of course you also have to be diligent in picking and choosing, in pacing yourself, and in taking time out periodically.

For those who are unable to get the time off from work, and for those who have to go easy on their budget, there are three FREE events, open to the public: 1) Thursday evening's Service of the Living Tradition, from 8 to 9:30 PM in the Convention Center; 2) Friday afternoon's Public Witness Event, Valuing All Families—An Interfaith Community Witness, with President Bill Sinkford from 5 to 6:30 PM in Stranahan Park, corner of Broward and Andrews; and 3) Sunday morning worship in the Convention Center from 9 to 10:15 AM. Sunday morning attendees will also have free admission to the Exhibit Hall where hundreds of booths display items of interest to UUs: books, allied organizations, seminaries, churches, UU wares.

One-day registration fee is only \$120, and those who attend Wednesday and Thursday pay only \$120 for the day-and-a-half.!

Don't miss out on this marvelous opportunity to sing songs with thousands of UUs, to converse with UUs from all over the country and the world, to experience exciting worship services, to thrill to visionary speakers, and to transform yourself in life-changing workshops! See you there!
